PROGRAMS:

Buddy Acoach introduced this week's guest speaker, Michael Lindsey, author of The Big Hat Law, a 75-year history of the Arkansas State Police. With a Master's Degree from the University of Arkansas, and a background in finance, Mr. Lindsey was looking for a subject that offered a historic perspective, which he found with the Arkansas State Police, as their "story" had never been told before. The highway commission was formed in 1913, and the Arkansas force began in 1935 with only 13 rangers, now troopers, as automobile fatalities were up, along with the end of prohibition, and other economic factors. By 1937, the force was up to 55 officers, as a 4-week training academy and first radio communication system was established. In 1957, the department size doubled, and every county was assigned at least one officer. They worked six days a week, ten hours per day, plus were on-call when off duty. Mr. Lindsey shared more current activity and affairs, and some fun "trooper" stories, and ended with a Q & A session.
